



Halima and Aleena have written about taking part in the Royal Society Young People's Book Prize as judges (p3-4), and Bella has written about being a Student Leader (p5)



In 2021, six Year 7 students were judges for Beckfoot
Oakbank in the Royal Society's Young people's Book Prize.
The Young People's Book Prize aims to promote young people's interest in and encourage them to read about science. It also supports the writing of really good and easy to read Science and Technology books for people under14.

We read each of the six books which were nominated, along with four other students, and filled in a sheet for each one to give it a score and say what we thought of it.

Considering Shamima Begum

One of the things we look at as part of our Student Assistant work is critical thinking, not taking things we see on the news or online at face value and questioning what we're told. As part of that work some of Year 8 and Year 10 Student Library Assistants looked at the case of Shamima Begum.

Shamima Begum is a girl whose story has been in the news and has caused a lot of controversy. Shamima Begum is a young woman who at the age of 15 left the UK with two of her schoolfriends. They flew to Turkey after skipping school (which is where her parents thought she was) to join the terrorist organisation ISIS.

Each student was given an information pack that contained both sides of the argument, and received the same articles, they were told to look at this from a neutral viewpoint, consider the situation carefully and assess her choices and their impact. Begum had British Citizenship, but it has since been revoked by the British government who regard her as a traitor. The Government have said she can apply for citizenship of Bangladesh, where her mother comes from. Begum's lawyers have appealed against this which has led to a court case that has been well covered in the news. This is where some of the controversy comes in, many say that all her family lives in England and that it is cruel to isolate her because she made a mistake.

But did she make a mistake? On the other side of the argument people are saying that she knew exactly what she was doing when she left England, and that even though she was a minor at the time, she is still responsible for her own actions. However, when she left she was only a minor, so the people that helped her technically trafficked her and so it is not necessarily her fault. Begum is now in her 20's and no longer classed as a minor so her court case will have heavier consequences.

Shamima Begum was found in a refugee camp, this has led to the belief that she needs help and that we cannot abandon her in a time of need. However, other argue that Begum must take responsibility for what she has done, although she was not involved in terrorist attacks it is said she shows no regret for any deaths that were caused by these violent attacks.

We had a discussion panel comprising four Year 8 and three Year 10 students, which I chaired, to debate our opinions on these issues after reading all the information we had been given on both sides.

We set rules in advance to avoid anyone interrupting, or speaking over someone else.

During the discussion, the majority of the students felt that Shamima Begum should be allowed to return to England, but that she should face consequences and special "rules" should be set in place to ensure everyone's safety.

Some of the ideas presented were a period of house arrest, time in prison and others said she would be watched so intensely by the media that it would be difficult for her to have any privacy anyway.

Begum herself has mentioned that she is willing to go to prison for a while as she realises that her actions have had consequences which will have repercussions, but obviously there would need to be charges and a trial first. This made the gathered students believe she deserves to return here and prove she is a different person now.

A final issue that should be thought about is the fact that the education system clearly failed her, after all she and her school friends left together and did not see any problems with what they were doing. Although it is clear that most of the radicalisation happened at their homes, there should have been more education around the dangers of that, along with that fact that nobody noticed three young girls boarding a plane on their own, or questioned why they were going to Turkey.

Overall, the case is a very controversial one and will continue to be so, but the conclusion of our panel was that on the evidence we saw she should be given a second chance but with precautions taken.
