16-19 Bursary

There are 2 types of Bursary:

Discretionary Bursary- available to those who are on Free School Meals and those whose household income is less that £22,500.

Priority Bursary- available to those who are or were in local authority care, receive income support/universal credit, receive ESA & DSA.

Students can use their bursary to purchase school related items- textbooks, equipment, train fair to uni/apprenticeship visits, UCAS applications and many more. Priority Bursary students could receive up to £1,200 per year depending on their attendance/A2L and attainment.

VESPA- The A level mindset

Over the last 15-20 years, much research into the psychology of success has been conducted and the findings are very interesting. Achieving the best grades possible in your A Levels is more than just learning the specification content. A particular set of skills and an advanced mindset is necessary. In other words, your attitude, self-beliefs about abilities and self-awareness of your own goals are essential to being an effective and successful A Level student.

Unfortunately, it is quite common for people to have a fixed mindset which is one that believes we are born with our levels of intelligence/personality/creativity. Or at best, that these are formed in childhood. This is an inaccurate view of ourselves. A growth mindset recognises that we are all constantly learning. This is the accurate way to view our minds and how our brains work. We are changing, growing as people all time and so is our capacity to learn and improve ourselves.

There has been very recent research conducted here in England into the mindset of A Level students. This research into the mindset concept has identified the following key elements:

Vision – know what you want to achieve

Effort – put in many hours of independent study

Systems – organise your learning, resources and time

Practise – again and again and develop your skills

Attitude – respond constructively when setbacks happen



Student leadership

Every Year 12 student will need to sign up to at least one leadership opportunity in the first term.

We want to enrich our students and to provide them with the opportunities to develop skills for employability and life.

Students will have the opportunity throughout the year to support occasion such as open evening and Primary School transitions but need to be involved in one of the following roles:

- Lunch and Social Time supervisors
- Library Support
- Astro and MUGA supervisors
- Peer readers
- SEND Assistants
- Faculty Assistants

Unifrog- The complete destinations platform

Unifrog is a one-stop-shop where students can easily explore their interests, then find and successfully apply for their next best step after school. Unifrog will help students explore their key interests and what career paths they can take to reach their goals!

The Sixth Form guidance allows students to explore the different University courses and Apprenticeships they may be interested in. It takes away some of the stress of finding a university and course suited to students, which is a big relief during such an important time.

Students provided time in registration to explore University courses, apprenticeships and look at all the different tools available on the destination platform, including the personality quiz and careers questionnaire.

UCAS and Apprenticeships

In May 2023 for Year 12 we will turn the focus to destinations with university applications open and Apprenticeship support and focus groups. All year 12 have 1-1 tutorials with tutors and Post 16 team also met with all students for a drop-in session so further support can be provided if required. We provide support with personal statements, applications, interview preparation and opportunities to update CV's. In Year 13 we continue with this bespoke support for each individual student and pride ourselves in ensuring all students have a destination when they leave us.



Attitude to Learning

In Post 16 we will collect attitude to learning data 5 times per year where students will be monitored on

- Attitude to learning
- Attendance- must be 100%
- Course work- must be up to date
- General work- all class work must be of a good standard and all homework completed
- Assessments- students must be predicted higher than E's in all academic subjects and predicted higher than Pass in all applied subjects.

It is vital students are prepared for year 13 and 'Ready for Success' aims to provide students with the opportunity to address any poor learning habits and re-visit the importance of Independent Learning, Pro-active and Re-active activities, and excellent attendance – all of these will be discreetly talked about, by tutors, on UCAS references, so we need to ensure students will be successful.



Independent Study

Microsoft Teams



We have made the decision to use Microsoft Teams as our way of setting work for students who are not in school and sharing materials with. We are also developing our use of this for setting and completing homework. It allows us greater flexibility to make lessons available, add revision resources and link to other tools we may use in school. This is an area we will continue to use and develop as a school over the coming weeks and months so it is important that students, and you as parents, become familiar with how this can help them.

Microsoft Teams is accessed using your child's school email address. All students should know their login details and how to access Teams. A copy of the information shared with students about how to access Teams is available on the school website. Students also have access to all the Microsoft applications including Word, PowerPoint, Excel and others when they login to Office 365 via the school website. It is not possible to create parent accounts on Teams.

Teachers will upload their lesson materials for every lesson onto Teams. This means that students who are absent can access them but in addition all students can continue to refer to them after the lesson has happened. Lesson materials can take several formats depending upon the subject. .

Where to get help if you need it.

Encourage your child to speak to their class teachers about how they can use Teams to support their learning.

If your child cannot access Teams - please email their tutor in the first instance.

If you have a question about a specific lesson – email the class teacher in the first instance.

Technology can be a challenge at times but if you have any queries get in touch with us so that we can try to address.

Our Learning Resource Centre (LRC) is open every day after school until 3.30pm

Your child can access the LRC after school and at breaks/lunches to do homework, read, access computers,

Students in Post 16 have plenty of opportunities to engage with career and future ready activities during tutor time, and through a variety of carefully planned assemblies and through the Journey of Life. Students can also attend Careers Club every Tuesday where the focus is on ensuring students can explore a variety of career pathways, with the main focus being on Level 5/6 courses, academic pathways, job application processes, and CV writing, and UCAS

As well as signposting around school, students have access to an independent Careers Advisor, as well as a bespoke Post 16 Teams page which is regularly updated with career related opportunities.

How to support learning

By doing home learning, your child will learn how to read and follow directions independently, manage and budget their time, complete their work neatly and to the best of their ability. It also helps them develop a sense of responsibility, pride in their work, and a work ethic that will benefit them well beyond their school years.

- 1. **Decide on the workspace:** Somewhere comfortable, quiet and accessible to you so you can provide encouragement and help. Some like the kitchen or dining room table while others prefer their room but check in periodically and review their work when it's completed if this is the case.
- 2. **Setting up for success:** Make sure it is well lit, comfortable, stocked-up with school supplies, quiet and free from distractions.
- 3. **Supporting them:** Help them interpret instructions, and review completed work. Resist the urge to provide the right answers just to get it done! They'll grow in confidence if you help them develop the problem-solving skills they'll need to get through the task.
- 4. **Make it routine:** Be clear that schoolwork is a priority with ground rules like using the workspace and agreeing a regular time to get it done. Make it clear that there's no TV, phone calls, video game- playing, etc., until it's done and checked.
- 5. **Empower them:** Some might want to tackle the harder tasks first, while others prefer to get the easier tasks over with. By helping them create a strategy when they're young, they'll do it independently later. Allow short breaks if needed, then guide them back to it with fresh focus and energy.
- 6. **Instil organisation skills:** Encourage your child to use their Learning Planner, Microsoft Teams, a calendar or reminders on their phone to help get organised.
- 7. **Make links to the "real world":** Talk about how meeting deadlines is important in the world of work, or how their learning history relates to today's news.
- 8. **Seek help if required:** Encourage them to ask an adult for help or email their teacher together. Contact their Head of Year if you have ongoing concerns or would like them to attend Homework Hub sessions after school. The LRC is another excellent facility to support your child's learning beyond the school day. It is open Monday to Friday from 8:00am 3:30pm. We are always open to your suggestions for workshops which support your child's progress.
- 9. **Praise them:** Recognise and reward their concentration, resilience and effort.
- 10. **Be a role model:** Whilst they work, do some reading, write letters, lists or emails. By showing that learning remains important and fun once school is over, you'll help them understand that building knowledge is something to enjoy throughout life.
